As the price of energy continues to rise steeply, we become increasingly aware of all that cheap oil has made possible in our lives. From globalisation and strawberries in December to plastics and medicines, all rely on abundant and cheap energy supplies.

Many experts now agree that world oil production is reaching its peak and that the age of cheap oil is drawing to a close. The list of oil producing nations in depletion is growing steadily.

A world without oil is hard to imagine, but it is possible and could, if properly planned and implemented, offer a higher quality of life than the present. Sweden has already announced its intention to be oil-free by 2020, with Finland set to follow. What would a low energy society look like? How would it feed, house and power itself? Do we wait until it is too late, or lead by example?



This new initiative, Transition Town Totnes, will seek to engage all sectors of the community in addressing this,

the great transition of our time. We offer no fixed answers, rather believing the solutions will arise from engaging the creativity, imagination and knowledge for which Totnes is so well known. TTT is designed to stimulate creative thought, and its aim over the next year is to create a timetabled plan for how Totnes can move to a lower energy future which is both abundant and delightful.

What is Peak Oil — in a Nutshell?

'Peak Oil' refers to the maximum extraction rate of oil, after which the rate of extraction will decline. It has been found that the extraction of oil always follows a more or less bell-shaped curve: first the oil is discovered and once it starts to be pumped out, the rate increases steadily until it reaches a peak, after which it becomes impossible to pump at the same rate: production will inexorably decline.

World discovery of oil peaked in 1964 and has been declining ever since, despite considerable improvements in technology, and there is no prospect of any significant large discoveries. We are currently consuming more than six barrels of oil for every one we discover. There is a growing consensus that we are now approaching, or are even at, the world oil peak.

PLANNING FOR LIFE AFTER THE PEAK

Transition Town Totnes builds on a project initiated by Rob Hopkins in Kinsale, Ireland in October 2004. The Kinsale Energy Descent Action Plan was the first attempt anywhere in the world to design a conscious pathway down from the oil peak. Utilising creative participation tools, community visioning and backcasting,


it created a practical model that has subsequently been adopted by communities around the world in their own relocalisation initiatives. 
